### Report for 2023-24 (Second term)

**INTRODUCTION:** In the Peace Group, there are 19 adorable children aged



4 to 5 years old. These children eagerly participate in all the activities at school. They arrive at 8:30 am and leave at 11:30 am after lunch. The children have developed a fondness for all the vegetables served to them and ensure to wash their hands and plates before meals. They maintain discipline by patiently queuing up and refrain from talking or wasting food during mealtime. Additionally, they prioritize cleanliness and hygiene, brushing their teeth upon arrival and tidying up their surroundings. The children share a close bond with their teachers and have learned various songs and mantras, enjoying singing and performing them with enthusiasm.





## PROJECT:



The children recently completed a project on animals, sparking excitement as they learned about creatures from their surroundings and beyond. They discussed village and jungle animals, discovering where they live and what they eat. A visit to the village allowed them to observe pet

animals first-hand. They expressed their understanding through drawings, storytelling, and mimicking animal sounds. The children enthusiastically engaged in rhymes and stories about animals, adding actions to enhance their learning experience.

## MATHEMATICS:

In mathematics class, the children are currently mastering counting up to 100 after successfully learning to count up to 50. Addition and subtraction



concepts are creatively introduced through storytelling, enhancing the enjoyment of learning mathematics. The children enthusiastically engage with math-related objects, eagerly retrieving them as requested. While most can count up to 50 fluently, some are still developing their skills in this area. The children find joy in applying mathematical concepts outdoors, utilizing various objects found in nature.

Additionally, they take pleasure in creating patterns with objects, further solidifying their understanding of mathematical principles.

## LANGUAGE:

During their Hindi and English classes, the children focus on honing their listening, thinking, and speaking skills. They delight in listening to stories from picture books, often retelling them in Hindi following their English rendition. Furthermore, they express their creativity by drawing pictures inspired by these stories, sometimes crafting their narratives based on their imagination. In their English lessons, they are expanding their vocabulary and attempting to articulate their names and simple sentences in English.



## GAMES:

The children have their games period starting at 8:30 am. Following breakfast, they gather in their group and retrieve their brushes for oral hygiene before assembling in a circle to engage in joint exercises with their teachers. Occasionally, they take the initiative in leading these exercises and count aloud as they perform them. Running games are particularly popular



among the children, who relish the opportunity to dash around the field. They also enjoy playing in the sandpit, where they engage in various activities.



Over time, they have acquired proficiency in numerous games, including "Fire on the Mountains," "Rat and Mouse," "Dog and Bone," "Chain Game," "Apple-Apple Banana," "Hide and Seek," "Ice and Water," and "Leader-Leader Change the Action," among others. Their laughter and enthusiasm are evident during games like "Chain Game" and "Hide and Seek," where they revel in the joy of falling down and getting back up. They enthusiastically hide in the grass and trees during "Hide and Seek," striving to play the game correctly. In the sandpit, they derive immense pleasure from leaping from heights and taking turns on swings and slides in an orderly queue.

### CELEBRATIONS:

The children of the Peace Group eagerly participate in all the programs and enjoy dressing up in costumes during school events. On 25th December,



they performed a song titled "I am a Little Star" with actions, shining brightly like stars themselves. On 26th January, Republic Day, they watched the parade on TV with excitement. For Vasant Panchami on 14th February, they sang the song "Namo Sharda" with adorable smiles, showcasing their enthusiasm. On 21st February, they performed a play titled "Mata Ka Rishta."
